Each year, Brain Tumour Foundation of Canada asks people to turn May Grey for Brain Tumour Awareness. This month, London firefighters will wear a grey ribbon to support the cause and have a special surprise for Facebook followers during Tuesday's launch.

"We are happy to partner with Brain Tumour Foundation of Canada to show our support for the brain tumour community here in London. The London Fire Department looks forward to turning grey in May," said Lori Hamer, Acting Fire Chief.

Everyday at least 27 Canadians are diagnosed with a brain tumour, making this a valuable partnership to spread more awareness of brain tumour signs and symptoms.

Brain tumours are also the leading cause of cancer death in children. They are unpredictable and complex. Brain tumours can affect vision, hearing, memory, balance and mobility. The effects from a brain tumour and its treatments are physical, emotional, financial, and last a lifetime.
